Please read the manual before calling customer service. Before calling, have the following information available:

- 1. Serial number (e.g., FT01234)
- 2. Transducer model (e.g., Nano17, Gamma, Theta, etc.)
- 3. Calibration (e.g., US-15-50, SI-65-6, etc.)
- 4. Accurate and complete description of the question or problem
- 5. Computer and software information. Operating system, PC type, drivers, application software, and other relevant information about your configuration.

If possible, be near the F/T system when calling.

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Glossary of Terms

Term	Definition
Calibration	The act of measuring a transducer's raw response to loads and creating data used in converting the response to forces and torques.
End-Effector	Any object attached to the robot flange (wrist) that serves a function. This would include robotic grippers, robotic tool changers, robotic crash protection, robotic rotary joint, robotic press tooling, compliance device, robotic paint gun, robotic deburring tool, robotic arc welding gun, robotic transgun, etc. End-effector is also known as robotic peripheral, robotic accessory, robot or robotic tool, end-of-arm (EOAT) tooling, or end- of-arm device.
F/T	Force/Torque.
F/T Transducer	Converts force and torque into an electrical signal.
Hysteresis	A source of measurement error caused by the residual effects of previously applied loads.

1. Safety

1.1 Explanation of Notifications

1.2 General Safety Guidelines

The customer should verify that the transducer selected is rated for maximum loads and moments expected during operation. Refer to F/T Transducer Manual (9620-05-Transducer Section—Installation and Operation Manual) found in Net F/T Installation and Operation Manual (9610-05-1022) or contact ATI Industrial Automation for assistance. Particular attention should be paid to dynamic loads caused by robot acceleration and deceleration. These forces can be many times the value of static forces in high acceleration or deceleration situations.

1.3 Safety Precautions

CAUTION: Do not remove any fasteners or disassemble transducers without a removable mounting adapter plate. These include Nano, Mini, IP-rated, and some Omega transducers. This will cause irreparable damage to the transducer and void the warranty. Leave all fasteners in place and do not disassemble the transducer.




CAUTION: Do not probe any openings in the transducer. This will damage the instrumentation.

CAUTION: Do not exert excessive force on the transducer. The transducer is a sensitive instrument and can be damaged by applying force exceeding the single-axis overload values of the transducer and cause irreparable damage. Small Nano and Mini transducers can easily be overloaded during installation. Refer to the F/T Transducer manual (9620-05-Transducer Section) for specific transducer overload values.

2. Product Overview

The Digital F/T connects using a high-speed RS-485 interface cable. The transducer's six strain gage values are digitized and sent over the high-speed interface cable to the host computer through a Serial Card, where software provided by ATI or customer software calculates the F/T data.

NOTICE: The system requires a computer with a RS-485 interface capable of communicating at 1.25 megabits/ second.



2.1 Serial Card

The Serial Card provides a RS-485 serial bus interface for ATI's RS-485 interface cable. The Serial Card interfaces with a user supplied computer. The serial card has to support a 1.25 MB baud rate.

2.2 Interface cable

A NET sensor to RS485 interface cable (9105-CF-MTS-DB9-X.X) is required to connect the transducer to the Serial Card and user power supply.

2.3 Power Supply

The Digital F/T system requires a customer supplied power supply with a voltage output of +12 VDC to +18 VDC and ability to supply 3 watts.


2.4 Transducers

The Digital F/T System connects directly to Net Transducers.

2.4.1 Transducer Functionality

The property of forces was first stated by Newton in his third law of motion: For every action there is always an opposed or equal reaction; or, the mutual action of two bodies upon each other are always equal, and directed to contrary parts. The transducer reacts to applied forces and torque using Newton's third law.





The force applied to the transducer flexes three symmetrically placed beams using Hooke's law:

 $\sigma = E\!\cdot\!\epsilon$

- σ = Stress applied to the beam (σ is proportional to force)
- E = Elasticity modulus of the beam
- $\epsilon =$ Strain applied to the beam

NOTICE: The transducer is a monolithic structure. The beams are machined from a solid piece of metal. This decreases hysteresis and increases the strength and repeatability of the structure.

Semiconductor strain gages are attached to the beams and are considered strain-sensitive resistors. The resistance of the strain gage changes as a function of the applied strain as follows:

 $\Delta \mathbf{R} = \mathbf{S}_{\mathbf{a}} \cdot \mathbf{R}_{\mathbf{O}} \cdot \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}$

 ΔR = Change in resistance of strain gage

 $S_a = Gage factor of strain gage$

 R_0 = Resistance of strain gage unstrained

 $\epsilon =$ Strain applied to strain gage

3. Installation

This section gives you information for the computer and system setup of the Digital F/T system.

3.1 Unpacking

- Check the shipping container and components for damage due to shipping. Any damage should be reported to ATI Industrial Automation.
- Check the packing list for omissions.
- The following are standard components for the Digital F/T system:
 - Transducer
 - Interface cable (9105-CF-MTS-DB9-X.X)
 - Serial Card and its CD
 - ATI CD containing software, calibration documentation, and manuals.



CAUTION: The transducer and serial card are susceptible to damage from electrostatic discharge whenever they are not connected to a plugged-in computer. Do not touch the electronics or the connector pins when handling the transducer.

3.2 Installing the Serial Card

Install the serial card hardware and its accompanying software following the instructions included with the hardware.

3.3 Configuring the Serial Card for Use with the Digital F/T System

Before using the Digital F/T with a National Instruments RS-485 serial interface, it is necessary to properly configure the communication and driver settings of the card for a two-wire interface and to use the card's FIFO buffers effectively:

3.3.1 Two Wire Communications

The Digital F/T control board uses a two-wire (half duplex) RS-485 connection. In this configuration, the same lines are used for transmitting and receiving data, therefore only one device at a time can transmit. Without proper configuration, this will also result in any data sent out by the master transmitter being echoed back to the master receiver, resulting in additional work for the software running on the master computer, as the echo will have to be read and discarded. National Instruments serial devices can be configured to automatically disable the receiver while transmitting to avoid receiving this echo.

3.3.2 FIFO Buffers

The National Instruments serial card has a hardware buffer that can hold up to 128 bytes. When the number of bytes in this hardware buffer reaches a configurable threshold, the card signals an interrupt so the client software can retrieve that data out of the hardware buffer. If the threshold level is set too close to the size of the hardware buffer, the client software may not finish pulling data out of the hardware buffer before the hardware buffer is completely filled up, resulting in lost data.

To configure the FIFO buffers and two wire communication, open Measurement and Automation Explorer for your serial card, select the serial device the sensor is to be connected to, open the "Advanced" properties panel, select the "2 Wire Auto" method in the "Transceiver Mode" pull down menu and set the FIFO buffer "Receive Buffer" threshold to a value lower than the maximum. The following example uses a threshold size of 64, which should work for most uses, but you can set the value higher or lower if you find your custom software has very specific timing requirements.

In this configuration, the National Instruments serial device will disable the receiver while transmitting by default. If you have other software which requires the echo to be present in two-wire mode, or uses a four-wire (full duplex) connection, you will have to use one of the following methods:


- Use another serial interface for that software.
- Change the default Transceiver Mode every time you switch between the ATI software and your other software.
- Rewrite the other software to manually configure the NI serial interface for the correct mode when it is started. The NI-Serial help file details how manually configure the NI serial interface in the section "RS-485 Transceiver Control".
- Write custom software for the Digital F/T that handles the echoed characters.
- Save MAX settings and close program.

3.4 Installing the Interface cable

Power down the computer with the serial card installed, ensure that computer in still plugged in. Before the transducer is installed, install the interface cable to the transducer and customer supplied power supply while set out on a clean work surface. Connect the interface cable to the transducer and power supply then to the serial card. After installing the interface cable the computer and power supply can be powered up.



CAUTION: The transducer and serial card are susceptible to damage from electrostatic discharge whenever they are not connected to a plugged-in computer. Do not touch the electronics or the connector pins when handling the transducer.



3.5 Installing the software

Install the ATI F/T software by inserting the CD into your computer. The installation program should start automatically. If it does not start automatically, you will need to run SETUP.EXE found in the root directory of the CD. Follow the installation instructions given by the program. The ATI F/T software CD contains software and calibration data that your computer uses to convert the transducer readings into usable force and torque output. It also contains Microsoft Windows drivers, sample programs, and detailed help files. The most recent release of the software can be downloaded from *http://www.ati-ia.com/Library/download.aspx*.

3.6 Demo Quick Start Guide:

The demo program monitors the raw strain gage values for saturation, when it is running. This will give feedback to help to avoid overloads and causing irreparable damage to the transducer. Smaller transducers can easily be irreparably damaged by applying small loads using tools (moment arm increases applied loads) when mounting the transducer.

NOTICE: Each transducer has a maximum measurement range and a maximum overload capacity. **Exceeding the transducer's overload capacity can cause permanent damage.** Smaller transducers have lower overload capacities. Tx and Ty are usually the easiest axes to accidentally overload. Strain gage saturation is the first indication that you are approaching a mechanical overload condition, and saturation always causes inaccurate F/T data, so it is critical that you monitor the F/T system for strain gage saturation.




Figure 3.2—Communication Error

Open the demo software. The first time you run it, it will probably not be configured to talk to the correct port that you have connected the transducer to, and you will receive this message:



Open the "Edit"->"Options" menu item to enter the settings screen.



On the options screen, enter the name of the COM port you have the transducer connected to. If you are not sure which port on the serial card you have connected the transducer to, you may have to try more than one port name before you find the correct port name.






To test if the port you have entered is correct, press the "Auto Set" button next to the "Baud Rate" field. If you have entered the COM port wrong, or the sensor is disconnected or powered off, you will receive this message:



If the sensor is powered on and connected to the port you have entered, you will receive a success message like this:

Press OK on the options screen to return to the main screen. Open the "Data"->"Calibrations" menu item to select the calibration:


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

One the calibration screen, select the calibration index for the calibration you wish to activate from the "Select Calibration" pulldown. If you did not order multiple calibrations on your sensor, only the first calibration will have any data:

Once you have selected the calibration you wish to activate, click the "Use This Calibration" button to close the calibration screen and return to the main form.





Click the "Start Streaming" or "Start On-Demand" button to start receiving data. If you press the "Start On-Demand" button, you can either press "Get Single Sample" when you wish to read a sample, or check the "Continuous" checkbox to have the demo automatically request data at the UI update period. Once you are receiving data, apply a gentle load to the sensor, being careful not to overload the sensor, to verify that you are able to read changes in the F/T data.

Option Screen Controls:

- COM Port: The name of the serial port the sensor is attached to.
- Baud Rate: The baud rate the sensor is configured for. Can be changed by the user.
- Auto Set: Will automatically scan all the available baud rates to see if the sensor is connected.
- Save Baud Rate: This checkbox must be checked before changing the baud rate in order for the new baud rate to be stored permanently during a power cycle.
- Stream Rate: The rate to configure the Digital F/T to stream data at. The maximum possible rates are 7000 at 1250000 baud, 500 at 115200 baud, and 50 at 19200 baud.
- UI Update Period: The number of milliseconds between UI updates. If "On-demand" sampling is selected, this is also the rate at which on-demand samples are requested from the sensor.
- Samples On Graph: The number of samples to keep in the history on the main screen graph.

Calibration screen, available from the "Data"->"Calibrations" menu item on the main form.

Calibration Screen Controls:

- Select Calibration: This pulldown allows you to select the calibration to load into the sensor. If you did not order multiple calibrations for your sensor, only the first calibration will have any useful data.
- Use This Calibration: Activates the selected calibration and User Force and Torque Units and closes the form.
- Write Calibration: Prompts user for a calibration file, which can be loaded into the selected calibration index. This should only be used if the calibration data stored in the sensor becomes corrupted, and only the calibration file or files which were included on the CD with the sensor should be written to the sensor. Writing any calibration data that was not provided by ATI for your specific sensor will render the system uncalibrated.
- User Force Units: The force units to display on the main screen.
- User Torque Units: The torque units to display on the main screen.

Tool Transformations Screen, available from "Data"->"Tool Transformations" menu item on main screen:


The tool transformation allows you to enter a series of tool transformations in order to measure the forces and torques acting at a point other than the origin of the sensor. The tool transformations are applied in the order you enter them, so you can determine, for example, if rotations occur before displacements by entering a tool transformation with only rotations before the rotation with displacements. If you specify both rotations and displacements within a particular tool transformation, displacements are performed first, in the order X, Y, Z, then rotations are performed, in the order X, Y, Z.

Tool Transformations Screen Controls:

- Displacement X, Y, and Z: The displacement along each axis is measured in the distance component of the calibration's torque units, so if your sensor was calibrated to use Newton-meters as the torque unit, the displacement is measured in meters.
- Rotations X, Y, and Z: The rotation about each axis, in radians.
- Add: Adds the current tool transformation to the transformation queue.
- Remove: Removes the highlighted transformation from the queue, and fills the displacement and rotation controls with the values of the removed transformation.
- Cancel: Returns to the main form without applying any changes you made to the transformation queue.
- Apply Transformation: Applies transformations in the queue and returns to the main form.

Displacement allows the customer to move the sensing reference frame origin along the X, Y, and Z axes. Displacement should be calculated and values should be entered before rotation. Displacement is measured in units which are set as either Nm or in-lbs. on the Calibration Screen. Refer to *Figure 3.8*.

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


Rotation allows the customer to rotate the axes while maintaining the frame origin. *Figure 3.14* shows the direction of rotation about the axis. Rotation is measured in radians.


When a value is entered for X, Y, or Z the following will result:

- X value will rotate Y and Z about X in the direction shown (see *Figure 3.14*).
- Y value will rotate X and Z about Y in the direction shown.
- Z value will rotate X and Y about Z in the direction shown.

In a tool transformation, the order of the rotations matters. The X-rotation occurs first, followed by rotation about Y (in its new orientation), then Z. Therefore, you MUST express your rotations in this order.



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Firmware Version screen, available from "Data"->"Firmware Version" menu item on the main form.

This screen shows the current firmware installed on the sensor. Press the OK button to dismiss and return to the main form.




Figure 3.16—Firmware Update Screen

You can use this to update the firmware on the Digital F/T. Only firmware files distributed from ATI for your specific device should be uploaded. The use of any other kind of file will render the sensor permanently inoperable.

Main Screen Controls:

- Bias: Takes the current reading and subtracts it from all future readings, using the current load as a tare.
- Clear Bias: Removes all previous tare points, so the sensor readings are raw outputs.
- Start Streaming/Stop Streaming: Toggles the streaming output of the sensor. When streaming, the sensor sends data at the frequency specified in the Streaming Rate field on the Options screen.
- Start On-demand/Stop On-demand: Toggles the on-demand output of the sensor. When the sensor is in on-demand mode, it outputs data only in response to requests from the user. This is useful for getting data at exact points in time.
- View Resolved F/T / View Gages: Switches the display and collected data between force/torque values and strain gages. The strain gage data is useful for diagnostic purposes if you ever have to call ATI Industrial Automation for support.
- Get Single Sample: When in on-demand mode, you can press this button to read a single sample and display it. The demo will not read another sample until you press the Get Single Sample button again, or activate another mode of reading data by using the Start Streaming button or the "Continuous?" checkbox.
- Continuous? : When in on-demand mode, the continuous checkbox causes the demo to request samples every time the UI updates.
- Append Streaming: When in streaming mode, activate this checkbox to append streaming data samples read from the sensor to the file specified next to the Append Streaming checkbox.
- Append One Shot: When in streaming or on-demand mode, this button is available to append only the most recent sample to the file specified next to the Append One Shot button.
- Status Word Get button: Reads the current status word from the sensor and displays it. Clicking on the status word will bring up a window describing the meaning of any error codes present in the status word.
- Session ID Get Button: Reads the current session ID.
- Session ID Set Button: Write the value in the session ID field to the sensor's session ID. The session ID is useful in automated applications to make sure the sensor has not been reset.

Saturation occurs whenever one or more gages is saturated. You can determine which gages are saturated by selecting "View Gages" and looking for gage values that are either 32767 or -32768 counts. These gage values will be highlighted in red.

NOTICE: When any strain gage is saturated or otherwise inoperable, **all transducer F/T** readings are invalid.

3.7 Installing the Transducer

Information on transducer installation can be found in the F/T Transducer Manual, 9620-05-Transducer Section, *F/T Transducer Installation, Operation, and Specification Manual.*

4. Operation

This section gives you information for the operation of the Digital F/T system.

4.1 Multiple Calibrations

Some transducers have multiple calibrations, usually to allow the transducer to have larger range in one instance and finer resolution in another. Changing to another calibration is done by loading the new calibration. This is done in the demo software through the *Data/Calibration* menu item.

NOTICE: When any strain gage is saturated or otherwise inoperable, **all transducer F/T** readings are invalid.

4.2 Detecting Sensitivity Changes

Sensitivity checking of the transducer can also be used to measure the transducer system's health. This is done by applying known loads to the transducer and verifying the system output matches the known loads. For example, a transducer mounted to a robot arm may have an end-effector attached to it.

If the end-effector has moving parts, they must be moved in a known position. Place the robot arm in an orientation that allows the gravity load from the end-effector to exert load on many transducer output axes.

Record the output readings.

Position the robot arm to apply another load, this time causing the outputs to move far from the earlier readings.

Record the second set of output readings.

Find the differences from the first and second set of readings and use it as your sensitivity value.

Even if the values vary somewhat from sample set to sample set, they can be used to detect gross errors. Either the resolved outputs or the raw transducer voltages may be used (the same must be used for all steps of this process).

5. Maintenance

This section gives you information for the maintenance of the Digital F/T system.

5.1 Periodic Inspection

For most applications, there are no parts that need to be replaced during normal operation. With industrialtype applications that continuously or frequently move the system's cabling, you should periodically check the cable jacket for signs of wear.

The transducer must be kept free of excessive dust, debris, or moisture. Applications with metallic debris (i.e., electrically-conductive) must protect the transducer from this debris. Transducers without specific factory-installed protection are to be considered unprotected. The internal structure of the transducers can become clogged with particles and will become no longer calibrated or even damaged.

5.2 Periodic Calibration

Periodic calibration of the transducer is required to maintain traceability to national standards. Follow any applicable ISO-9000-type standards for calibration. ATI recommends annual calibrations, especially for applications that frequently cycle the loads applied to the transducer.

5.3 Resolution

ATI's transducers have a three sensing beam configuration where the three beams are equally spaced around a central hub and attached to the outside wall of the transducer. This design transfers applied loads to multiple sensing beams and allows the transducer to increase its sensing range in a given axis if a counterpart axis has reduced (see 9620-05-Transducer Section—Installation and Operation Manual).

The resolution of each transducer axis depends on how the applied load is spread among the sensing beams. The best resolution occurs in the scenario when the quantization of the gages is evenly distributed as load is applied. In the worst case scenario, the discrete value of all involved gages increases at the same time. The typical scenario will be somewhere between these two.

F/T resolutions are specified as typical resolution, defined as the average of the worst and best case scenarios. Because both multi-gage effects can be modeled as a normal distribution, this value represents the most commonly perceived, average resolution. Although this misrepresents the actual performance of the transducers, it results in a close (and always conservative) estimate.

6. Troubleshooting

Bad data from the transducer's strain gages can cause errors in force/torque readings. These errors can result in problems with transducer biasing and accuracy. Listed below are the basic conditions of bad data. Use this to troubleshoot your problem.

Symptom	Cause	Resolution	
Noise	Noise can be caused by mechanical vibrations and electrical disturbances, possibly from a poor ground. It can also indicate component failure within the system.	Make sure that the DC supply voltage for the Digital F/T has little to no noise superimposed.	
Drift	Drift is caused by temperature change, mechanical coupling, or internal failure. Mechanical coupling is caused when a physical connection is made between the tool plate and the transducer body (i.e., filings between the tool adapter plate and the transducer body).	Check for debris around transducer.	
Hysteresis	Hysteresis is caused by mechanical coupling (explained in Drift section) or internal failure.	Check for debris around transducer.	

If, after configuring the NI Serial device for two-wire RS485 mode, the Digital FT does not respond to commands, it is possible you have encountered a bug in the National Instruments driver software whereby the correct transceiver mode is not always activated. Make sure you have installed the latest NI Serial driver software from *www.ni.com*. If you are experienced with using an oscilloscope, it will be helpful to make sure that the transmit lines on the NI Serial device are actually activating when the software tries to send data. If the card is transmitting correctly, but the sensor is not responding, contact ATI for support with the Digital FT. If the card does not transmit when in "2 Wire Auto" transceiver mode, and you have the latest NI Serial software, try putting the card and NI Serial software in another computer and attempting to use it in the other computer. If it still does not work, you may have to contact National Instruments for support with the NI Serial device.

8. Programming Information

This section contains programming information about the Digital F/T System.

8.1 Physical Serial Interface

The interface cable by default runs at 1.25 megabaud. The baud rate can also be set to 115,200 or 19,200, although this will result in slower streaming output rates.

The interface cable uses a two-wire half-duplex configuration – the sensor cannot receive bytes while it is writing. Therefore, to stop streaming, it is necessary to send a jamming sequence of at least 14 characters, which is one byte longer than a streaming sample.

The transducer uses a 9-bit format with 8 bits of data and the last bit used for 'even' parity.

8.3 Modbus Interface

The Modbus interface follows the timing and checksum rules specified in the "Modbus Over Serial Line" specification at *http://www.modbus.org/specs.php*.

The analog board runs as a Modbus slave until the 'start streaming' custom Modbus command is sent, after which it starts streaming data until it receives a 14-byte jamming sequence (the jamming sequence can consist of random character values).

If you are writing your own Modbus interface to the Digital F/T, you must support the "Read Holding Registers" (Section 6.3 in the "Modbus Protocol Specification" v1.1b) command and one or both of the "Write Single Register" (Section 6.6) and "Write Multiple Registers" (Section 6.12) commands. You must also be able to send Custom (aka "User-Defined") function codes.

Each serial Modbus packet has the following structure (taken from Section 2.3 of the "Modbus Serial Line Protocol and Implementation Guide" v1.02):

The sensor uses a fixed Modbus slave address of 10, and only communicates using the binary "RTU" serial Modbus packet format. The CRC calculation for the binary RTU mode, including sample source code, is described in Section 6.2.2 of the "Modbus Serial Line Protocol and Implementation Guide" v1.02.

8.4 Data Structures

8.4.1 Endianness

The Digital F/T stores all numbers in big-endian (aka "Network Order") format. If your host system uses a little-endian ("Byte-swapped") format, any custom software you write will have to swap the bytes in each numeric field before performing any calculations using those values.

The fields G0–G5 make up the gage vector. When calculating F/T values, this vector is multiplied with the calibration matrix using the standard matrix multiplication algorithm.

NOTICE: The strain gages are sent in the order (G0, G2, G4, G1, G3, G5), and must be reordered to (G0, G1, G2, G3, G4, G5) before performing F/T calculations (or the calibration matrix itself can be reordered to accommodate the streaming sample ordering). The streaming sample is structured this way in order to sample the gages which cooperate on the most axes as close together as possible.

The 'check' field is a single byte containing a checksum and a status bit:

The additive checksum can be calculated using the following algorithm. The '&' operator in the following pseudocode indicates a bitwise 'and' operation, and the 'sampleBytes' parameter contains the 13 bytes that make up a streaming sample packet.

The status bit is 0'if the system is healthy, or 1'if there is an error code. If the status bit indicates an error, stop streaming by sending a jamming sequence of 14 bytes, then use standard Modbus to read the system status holding register to get the full error code. The jamming sequence can consist of arbitrary values, any character value will stop streaming.

Since there is no contingency in Modbus for high-speed streaming data, the streaming samples are not sent in standard Modbus packets – they are sent without any encapsulation. This requires the client software to disable any Modbus processing of received packets while data streaming is active.

Each calibration structure is 338 bytes long, so to read the settings for a particular calibration, start at the address of the desired calibration from *Table 8.4* and read 169 holding registers, since each register is two bytes wide. It will be necessary to split the reading up into multiple Modbus commands, due to length restrictions in the Modbus protocol.

8.5 Tool Transformations

A tool transformation is a mathematical procedure that allows you to calculate the force and torque values that are acting at a point other than the origin of the sensor itself, and also allows you to rotate the reference frame, for example to line up the sensor axes with your tooling axes. The transformation is calculated by applying rotation and translation matrices to the original calibration matrix (the "BasicMatrix" element of the calibration structure).

In general, the transform takes the following form:

Where "dx", "dy", and "dz" are the displacements along the x, y, and z axes respectively. The units of the displacements must match the distance components of the torque units used in your calibration (e.g., if your sensor reports torque in Newton-meters, the displacements must be measured in meters).

Because matrix math is associative, you can pre-calculate the factor from "Equation 1" and use the resulting matrix in all subsequent force/torque calculations, until you wish to create a new tool transformation.

It is important to note that the tool transformation procedure, as described here, applies the displacements and rotations in the following order:

1. Displacements. The order of axis displacements does not matter, as long as they are all done together with no rotations between displacements.

- 2. Rotation about X.
- 3. Rotation about Y.
- 4. Rotation about Z.

If you wish to apply the elements of the transform in a different order, you can either calculate the rotation and displacement matrices using the order appropriate to your application or you can apply the algorithm as described above multiple times, and only apply one element of the transform (e.g., one rotation or one displacement) at each step, as in the following pseudocode:

To use the above algorithm to apply transform elements in a particular order, you would construct a queue containing the transform elements in the order you wish to apply them, and then call the OrderedTransform method with the original calibration matrix and your transform list as arguments.

8.6 To Read Calibrated F/T Data from the Sensor

- 1. Set the sensor up to use the correct RS-485 baud rate for your application. By default, the sensor runs at 1,250,000 baud.
- 2. Optionally set the session ID register to protect against unexpected reboots.
- 3. Read the calibration information for the calibration you wish to activate, and apply any tool transformations you wish to apply to the calibration matrix to create the active calibration matrix.
- 4. Send the 'Unlock storage command' to unlock the active gain and offset hardware settings.
- 5. Write the active gain and offset hardware settings using the "GageGain' and "GageOffset" values from the calibration structure. You must do this every time the sensor is reset, because these values are not stored to nonvolatile memory.
- 6. Send the "unlock storage command' again to lock the gain and offset against accidental writing.
- 7. Send the "Start Streaming" command.
- 8. When each streaming sample is received, check the status bit for system health and the checksum for sample validity. If the status bit is 1, indicating a system error, go to step 11 to stop streaming, then read the system status word using standard Modbus.
- 9. To bias (tare) the sensor, take a reading when the sensor is in its default or unloaded state. Save these gage values as the "bias vector". For each subsequent sample, subtract the bias vector from the sampled strain gage vector to remove the bias from the calculated F/T data.
- 10. Multiply the strain gage vector (with the bias vector subtracted) by the active calibration matrix to calculate the F/T values. The resulting vector will contain the force and torque values, scaled by the counts per force and counts per torque reported in the calibration structure.
- 11. When you are ready to stop streaming, send a jamming sequence of 14 bytes (one byte longer than the streaming sample size) to ensure the sensor receives at least one character. Wait before sending any more Modbus commands to allow the sensor's internal Modbus stack to timeout and throw away the characters from the jamming sequence.
